
What does the fund invest in?

The Fund's objective is to provide interest income and capital preservation. The Fund seeks to provide interest income by holding all of its portfolio assets directly or indirectly in interest rate bearing instruments such as demand deposit accounts, high quality, short-term fixed income securities issued by Canadian federal or provincial governments, Canadian chartered banks, and loan, trust and other companies operating in Canada, pending the automatic switch of fixed amounts into eligible mutual funds managed by Manulife Investment Management Limited as pre-selected by the investor. The Fund does not invest in foreign securities.

How risky is it?

The value of the Fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

The Manager has rated the volatility of this Fund as low.

This rating is based on how much the Fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the Fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money


Like most mutual funds, this Fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how the Advisor Series securities of the Fund have performed over the past 10 years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the series' returns.

Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how the Advisor Series securities of the Fund have performed in each of the past 10 years. The Fund has not dropped in value in the past 10 years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the Fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the Fund will perform in the future.



Best and worst 3-month returns

This table shows the best and worst returns for Advisor Series securities of the Fund in a 3-month period over the past 10 years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

Average return

The annual compound return of the Advisor Series securities of the Fund was 1.53% since June 30, 2009. If you had invested \$1,000 in the Fund on June 30, 2009, on June 30, 2019 your investment would now be worth \$1,164.

Who is this fund for?

The Fund is suitable for investors who:

- · Are looking for liquidity
- Prefer a low level of investment risk
- Are seeking a gradual approach to investing in long-term mutual funds
- Are investing for the short term less than 1 year

A word about tax

In general, you'll have to pay income tax on taxable distributions made to you by the Fund and on any gains you make if you redeem your securities in the Fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws that apply to you and whether or not you hold the Fund in a registered plan, such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan or Tax-Free Savings Account.

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered account, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you receive them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Advisor Series securities of the Fund. The fees and expenses - including any commissions - can vary among series of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

Sales charges

You have to choose a sales charge option when you buy the Fund. Ask about the pros and cons of each option.

Fund expenses

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the returns of the Fund. As of December 31, 2018, the Fund's expenses were 0.00% of its value. This equals \$0.00 for every \$1,000 invested.

More about the trailing commission

The trailing commission is an ongoing commission. It is paid for as long as you own the Fund. It is for the services and/or advice that your representative and their firm provide to you.

The Manager pays the trailing commission to your representative's firm. It is paid from the Fund's management fee and is based on the value of your investment. The rate depends on the sales charge option you choose.

Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch securities of the Fund.

Switch fee	Your representative's firm may charge you up to 2.0% of the value of securities you switch to another mutual fund. Such switch fees do not apply to the automatic switches into the mutual funds pre-selected by you for this Fund.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- Withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual fund securities within two business days after you receive a Simplified Prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- Cancel your purchase order within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the Simplified Prospectus, Annual Information Form, Fund Facts document or Financial Statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
