# Strengthening Our Overseas Markets For 2025 And Beyond

Welcome to the first edition of Manulife Forest Times for 2025. I am writing this on my way home from India where Robert, Lance and I have been visiting customers and service agents with the AVA CEO and Board. Please see photos on page 15.

NZ log exports recommenced to India last year after a two-year pause due to Indian fumigation requirements. Our export joint venture (AVA) has been able to work to the new rules (fumigation in India) and have quickly captured 43% of NZ's total share of the Indian market since May 2024. Our customers in India are very enthusiastic about our return as they recognise the benefit in dealing with a forest owner versus log traders that stepped into the trade following the exit of NZ supply.

The key region for log imports in India is the Kandla region with just over 3 million m<sup>3</sup> imported there in 2024, of which 85% was pine. Our pine is competing with pine logs from Australia and South America and we heard from customers that NZ logs are favoured as they have better recovery and less staining compared to our competitors. The one disadvantage for us is NZ logs receive a 5.5% tariff which equates to US\$8-9/ m<sup>3</sup> duty paid by importers to the Indian government. The Australian government negotiated a Free Trade Agreement (FTA) with India removing their tariff. The NZ Prime Minister visited India in March for FTA negotiations and we are hopeful our government will be successful in removing the log tariff. If so, it will ensure we receive a premium for our logs and help make India a genuine competitor to the Chinese market.

This time last year we faced a very unstable market in China and we are watching similar conditions unfold with low port offtake in recent weeks and growing inventory. Inventory levels are at 3.9 million m³ across ports and offtake is low at <60k m³/day. On a positive note, shipping and exchange rates are in our favour. In the background to all of this, we have the impact of Trump's tariffs on log markets. The varied tariff rates, on/off exceptions, and further negotiations all add uncertainty to the markets and increase the likelihood of a global economic slowdown. These are all great reasons for the strategy adopted by our clients of having strong market diversification.

In March we had our company dinner and a highlight of the evening was for new staff to get up on stage and introduce themselves (see the photo and separate article in this edition). I want to thank the staff for sharing their story and backgrounds with us on the night. You all did a great job and we are fortunate you choose to work at MFM (NZ). We also recognised two staff who achieved their 20-year anniversary with MFM (NZ). Henry Tibble and Michael Elix are the first individuals to reach this milestone and it was a pleasure to be able to recognise this achievement and thank them for their important contributions to our clients, people and the wider NZ forest community.

Since our last edition we have had Richard Arderne (Forestry Manager) join us at MFM (NZ). As always, please take the time to welcome him when you get the opportunity.

# National Managers' Update



# Andrew Widdowson National Operations Manager

2025 is moving along at a rapid pace and at the time of writing, the Easter long weekend is just around the corner. The prolonged dry weather we have experienced this summer has extended well into autumn, making for good engineering and harvesting

conditions. However, one has to feel for the farming community who are heading into winter with limited feedstock.

While we have seen fire danger levels creeping up this summer, it is pleasing to report that we have not had any vegetation fires this season in our client forest estates. A number of our staff and forestry contractors have assisted with the suppression of several vegetation fires that occurred on neighbouring properties. On this note, I would like to acknowledge the leadership of our Protection Forester, Jarron McInnes, who has provided strong collaborative leadership in co-ordinating contract resources to assist FENZ with these fires. Equally, a note of thanks to Ace of Spades Contracting, Eastern Airworks and Forest Protection Services for their professional firefighting response.

We recently completed a large pre-plant aerial desiccation programme over 3,400 hectares in preparation for 2025 planting. Thank you to staff and contractors for their early starts, and occasional weekend work, to complete this programme.

Our Planning and Engineering team have enjoyed good operating conditions since January. As of 1 April, we have 9.5 million tonnes harvest planned and 3.2 million tonnes harvest ready. As you can appreciate, results on this scale require a large amount of investment, resources and teamwork.

Our Harvesting operations are operating at full production and delivering on our value and quality targets across all clients and regions. External environmental audits from councils have been very positive this year with full compliance outcomes recorded. The trust we have established with councils through careful engineering and harvesting operations, in sometimes challenging terrain, has enabled MFM (NZ) to negotiate practicable solutions in managing harvesting debris levels greater than the new 15 cubic meters per hectare standard.

Our Distribution team continues to manage the distribution of 600 loads each day to multiple customer sites within Northland, Eastern Bay of Plenty and CNI regions. During 2024 we engaged an external commercial road transport consulting company to review our safety performance in our distribution operations. This independent review identified a number of areas and opportunities for improvement which we are now beginning to action in collaboration with our distribution suppliers.

In closing, I would like to acknowledge the dedication and professionalism of Laresia Heke, Darrell Tahere, Mike Baker and Geoff Gover, their operational teams, and our committed and professional contractors who perform to a high level every day. It is a privilege to work with such a large group of talented people.

#### **FUN FACT:**

1 years ago we collaborated with the same partners to develop the Steep Slope Winch Assisted Workshop, another first of its kind.

The New Zealand Forest Products (NZPF) reunion took place in Tokoroa on February 22-23 with 260 attendees. We were delighted to assist by providing an escorted tour through the OJI site, where participants visited the garage now used for scaling, a place where many began their apprenticeships. The tour included a 20-minute trip through the forest to a swing yarder operation, allowing attendees to witness a fully-mechanised steep slope operation. From their safe zone, they were amazed by the machinery and the absence of ground personnel. The evening concluded with dinner and a catch-up session at the club, where it was wonderful to reconnect with legends in their field and mentors to many of us.

While it has been a relatively dry late summer/early autumn, we have fortunately had no significant fires within the MFM (NZ) managed estate this season. However, there were a number of fires, some quite

near to the estate, which were attended by staff and contractors. These fires were valuable in providing further experience for our contractors and MFM (NZ), as well as building relationships, particularly with FENZ, DOC and other forest owners. Thanks to all the people who have been involved in the fire season this year.

Over the last six months, MFM (NZ) has been trialling chemical thinning as another method of thin for value in some parts of the MFM (NZ) managed estate. Initial trials have been carried out by Forest Protection Services (FPS) in stands in the MFM (NZ) Northern region, while some smaller trials have recently been implemented in the MFM (NZ) Central and Eastern regions. MFM (NZ) will be looking at the opportunity to utilise this thinning method initially in any stands requiring thinning at a later age or where the terrain (slope) is deemed excessive.

As initially reported in the November edition of Manulife Forest Times, the production thinning operation in Matahina Forest has now been completed, with the total volume supplied within an impressive 20 tonnes of target. Thanks to Jensen Logging and Self Loader Logging for completing this operation over the last six months.

Finally, in regard to the MFM (NZ) forestry team, Richard Arderne has recently joined the team as the Forestry Manager for the MFM (NZ) Eastern region based out of Rotorua. Richard has responsibility for the establishment, silviculture and protection operations of the OTPP NZ, Waonui, Tiaki and TPL Eastern estates and is looking forward to meeting contractors and understanding the operational requirements across the region.

Where has the year gone? For much of the North Island, we have been blessed with hot fine days that have allowed the Engineering team to make significant progress with the

construction programme.

In the last edition of Manulife Forest Times, I noted a significant milestone for the Engineering team, in that they had reached five years without somebody being hurt where they had to take time off for the injury (five years LTI-free). I spent considerable time looking at the reported incidents that were occurring and the numbers of incidents. What was disappointing was the poor number of near miss or hazard reports we were receiving at that time. The reports received were all valuable and told a story however, they were few and far between.

In the hope of improving reporting, we introduced a reward (\$100 grocery voucher) each month for a random drawn report. The results have been exceptionally pleasing and I thank all those that have taken the time to report the incidents. The one common theme in recent reports was they involved a hazard that had the potential to hurt others. Having the reports, and being made aware of the hazards, has allowed the Manulife team to direct repairs or changes to minimise or eliminate the risk. Keep the reports rolling in please.

For those in the Engineering team reading this, the reports you send to my team are entered into a programme called Velocity for management and reporting. The business now has a mobile app and contractors can enter the incident directly into Velocity. If you are not already using this, then please talk with your Forest Engineer or Rona Wheeldon (rwheeldon@manulife.com) to be added to the system. Rona knows her way around the system more so than anyone, and will be able to assist with any teething issues.

Looking back at previous articles, I generally write about the dirt that is being pushed and roads or landings constructed but have missed acknowledging the team that does all the hard yards in the background that allows it all to happen. The Harvest Planning team is a small, diligent team who go about their work with little fuss. The staff tend to be experienced personnel who have worked in most facets of the industry, allowing them to have a considered view of the entire harvest process. The outcomes they present are the best overall outcomes for the business, balancing all the constraints. It may not be the best outcome for Engineering or Harvesting or Distribution but it is the best outcome across the business. The five planners walk around 8,000 hectares annually, planning around 4.3 million tonnes. Although the team may have the odd grey hair amongst them, they are no slugs at adopting technology. They build and use three-dimensional computer models employing AI to determine road and landing positions. Once the modelling is complete, days are spent in the field validating the plan and modifying it based on the constraints encountered. I am grateful to this team and thank them for their undying lust for the role.

# The Distribution Safe Start events held in January 2025

All truck drivers working for MFM (NZ) clients were required to attend one of the 2025 Distribution Safe Start meetings held in Tokoroa and Rotorua in January. The goal was to allow drivers to reconnect, reset and refocus after the holiday break. Key safety messages were shared around seatbelt compliance, MFM (NZ) Life Saving Rules and safe loads.

Katrina Aubrey, Fatigue and Sleep Health Consultant for Autosense, shared some valuable tips on getting good sleep and managing fatigue. All attendees received a 'goodie bag' that contained items of relevance to the discussion such as an apple to combat the post-lunch dip and nuts to provide energy.

Guest speakers Greg Murphy (V8 Supercar driver), and Honey Hireme-Smiler (New Zealand rugby league and rugby representative), spoke of their experiences as high-profile sportspeople and how they have overcome challenges to be successful on the world stage. The talks were aimed at inspiring drivers to focus on looking after themselves, overcoming challenges, to embrace technology in improving safety, and to achieve our goal of everyone goes home safe every day.



# The Allied Forensic Group (AFG) Expert Safety Review of Log Transport and Distribution Operations

Allied Forensic Group (AFG) Expert Safety Review of Log Transport and Distribution Operations started the week commencing 29 April 2024. This was a follow-on from the 2017/18 George Rechnitzer and Associates Pty Ltd (GRA) safety review.

The objective was to review actions implemented since GRA, analyse reasons why on-road incidents continue to occur despite efforts to manage risk, evaluate inherent factors that contribute to the frequency of incidents, and recommend practical measures to enhance safe management procedures and cultures.

AFG's process for information and data collection involved:

- Document/material review e.g. policies, contracts and industry guidelines
- Review of incidents with specific focus on 'new' rollover incidents
- Site visits and inspections (Harvesting, Engineering, port and log yards)
- Log truck rides
- Surveys and interviews with drivers, managers, dispatch and other parties e.g. C3, LTSC.

AFG have completed their analysis and MFM (NZ) clients, Taumata Plantations Limited, Tiaki Plantations Company and OTPP New Zealand Forest Investments Limited, have now received final reports. A small group will work on creating an action plan using a risk-based approach in prioritising the recommendations, along with considering what is required for implementation.

We would like to extend a special thanks to all those contractors (and their employees) and MFM (NZ) staff who put time aside to be involved in this review. Information on the outcomes of the review and the subsequent action plans will be shared as we work through next steps.

# Work being undertaken in the Kawerau Log Yard to maximise rail wagon capacity

60' wagons were introduced into Tiaki from February 2023 with 100% of the fleet swapped out by mid-August 2023. This was driven by KiwiRail and was a conversion project to remove old wagons from the system and update the fleet. These wagons were bigger than the originals, with three bunks for loading and a max payload of 48.5 tonne.

The length mix of export logs in Tiaki provided challenges with loading on the three-bunk configuration of the 60' wagons, which was considerably different to the old-style wagon. A workshop was held to look at loading issues and to find options and solutions to loading. The 5.94m log length was identified as being problematic for the wagon configuration and after discussions with KiwiRail, it was determined that a 50' wagon with two bunks would be a better configuration for this length. The team worked with KiwiRail to get this solution in place and 50% of the Tiaki wagon fleet are now supplied in this 50' configuration.

Average JAS per wagon is reported to MFM (NZ) by KiwiRail each month. Since the implementation of these 50' wagons, the average JAS per wagon has decreased in Tiaki. Increasing the JAS per wagon provides an opportunity to get more capacity from the

same number of wagons, to use what we have more efficiently. A second workshop was held in February to work on optimal combinations for this wagon type.

Wagons were loaded with different combinations of grade and length, photos were taken and then the wagons were scaled. From this, the team were able to develop a simple loading guide which has quick and simple loading combinations that are optimal for each wagon type. These are now in each loader cab.

As a result, we have seen the average JAS lift to 37.7 JAS per wagon, up from 34.67 JAS the month prior. This is a pleasing result for all parties. This step change equates to an extra 4-5 wagons' worth of logs per day, which is just over one extra train per week (with the same number of wagons).

# Elimination of trailer lifting – Rotorua Forest Haulage Limited's folding trailer unit

The Distribution team was excited to have the RFH Folding 5-axle trailer unit undertake its first operational load on 26 November 2024, from Crew 43 to Red Stag. This configuration replicates the standard 9-axle truck and trailer units commonly used in our operations but eliminates the need for trailer lifting.



### 2024 Distribution Safety Awards

Throughout 2024 the Distribution team awarded 195 MFM (NZ) Distribution Safety Awards. These accolades recognised positive driving behaviour and other commendable health and safety measures undertaken by those in our operations. This has been an initiative that was well received by the Distribution contractors and drivers and will continue for 2025.

### Kinleith Forest, Tokoroa – 100 years old

The planting of what was to become Kinleith Forest commenced just over 100 years ago in 1924, with a relatively small area of 180 hectares of predominantly radiata pine established near Putaruru (Pinedale block).

However, this increased significantly to 4,300 hectares established in 1925 and a remarkable 18,700 hectares and 28 million trees established in 1926 (deemed a world record at the time). This compares with a total of 4,500 hectares and 3.8 million trees established by MFM (NZ) across its entire New Zealand managed estate in 2024.

The world record planting season of 1926 also included some other notable achievements, including the construction of 20 houses or store sheds, 112 kilometres of roads, 11 bridges and the stringing of 55 kilometres of telephone wires overland.

The workforce at the height of the 1926 planting season reached just over 630 people, with the planting crews living in a number of camps of 25-30 men on site. As planting was throughout winter, the crews had to contend with long periods of cold and wet conditions (it was also an exceptionally wet year with 33% more rain than average).

At the time, the people involved in the establishment of the forest probably did not realise the legacy that they were creating for future generations and what MFM (NZ) staff, contractors, as well as our industry and community get to benefit from today such as employment and recreation.

Note: Some of these original plantings still stand at Karaka Rd (1925), Owen Rd (1927) and Sequioa Rd (1927).

### **Shred Roads**

For a number of years the business has continued to grapple with management of the slash buildup around landings (birds nests).

Over the last few years it has become more of a topic of discussion post the East Coast floods and debris flows during the cyclones. For the last year or two, a small number of businesses have been collaborating and reviewing the opportunity to shred the timber to be used as a replacement for aggregate on the road network.

In February, the Harvest Planning/Engineering team, with senior harvesting staff, visited a site in the upper Hawke's Bay to view a shred road in action within the PanPac estate. The results were surprisingly good, however, the soil and weather conditions were also exceptional and these perfect conditions need to be

In order to determine the appropriateness for use in the MFM (NZ) estate, a small trial is planned for construction over the coming month for use in the winter months with differing grades of slash.

- Trial 1 will be shredded binwood and pulp log
- Trial 2 will be birds nest heavy woods (larger branching etc)
- Trial 3 will be all birds nest material with fines etc.

The trial is planned on a section of road that services a single landing and will be backed up with a supply of aggregate within proximity if we have a failure and need to abandon. The secondary relief plan is to ensure the impact does not affect the harvesting or distribution activity.

The trial in Hawke's Bay was on conventional log truck roads whereas the trial in MFM (NZ) estate is for a staging truck.

Further updates will be posted so keep an eye out.

Ultimately, the competition was a fun and practical way to apply lessons learned from pumpkin growing to the forest management work we all do. 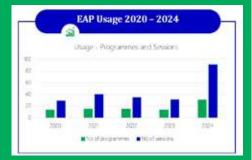

In 2024, EAP delivered 90 sessions to support our staff, contractors, and their employees, marking a 200% increase from 2023.

Since November 2024 I've been delivering the "Hey Mate" Awareness Training across the MFM (NZ) supply chain. To date, over 200 individuals across the MFM (NZ) estates have completed the training.

The crew sessions have been done out on the work site in order to create a comfortable atmosphere that encourages individuals to speak freely and in confidence. Some have opened up to share their experiences with the group and others have approached me individually for a more in depth one-on-one korero. This has been very encouraging, as discussing mental health is beginning to become the norm, and the stigma is being diminished.

Feedback provided from visits indicates that the following areas have been recognised by participants as relevant and important to apply to their own lives:

- Recognising distress signs and when to seek help
- Knowing what the available support and resources are
- How to ask the right questions
- Green Brain vs Red Brain
- Te Whare Tapa Whā well-being framework
- Confidence to seek help

The next tier of training, 'Co Mate,' equips learners with advanced skills to recognise and address mental health distress in themselves and others. Participants can apply these skills in their personal lives, with friends and whanau and at work.

We are currently working through a process to select candidates for this advanced training.
